

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
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Festival Artist Biographies

Daria Adams, violin

*ADOPTED BY JOHN AND MELINDA MOYNIER

Daria Adams, the founding Artistic Director of Music in the Vineyards Festival along with her husband Michael, is a member of the worldrenowned Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra. Since joining the SPCO in 1987, she has traveled the world in tours to Asia, Europe and across North America. An ardent Baroque music performer, Daria is a founding member of the Blue Baroque Band, a Minnesota-based ensemble made up of colleagues from the SPCO. The BBB was a featured ensemblein-residence at MITV in 2006, which coincided with the release of their debut CD.

Daria has been a quest at many prominent music festivals: in Newport, Rhode Island: Banff, Alberta, Canada: the Cactus Pear Festival in Texas; the Bach Dancing and Dynamite Society in Madison, Wisconsin; the Festival de Musica Rondena in Albuquerque and Lyon France and Vaasa Finland.

Daria holds degrees in Violin Performance from the New England Conservatory and the State University of New York at Stonybrook. A big opera fan, Daria spent four years playing in the Santa Fe Opera Orchestra, where she also took an interest in a musician sitting in the back of the pit, one Michael Adams. It soon became an interesting summer. She now lives in Minneapolis with her husband, three children (15, 13 and 11), a dog and a cat.

Kiana Adams, soprano

Kiana, age 15, has already amassed an impressive list of accomplishments in theater, TV and film in the Minneapolis, St. Paul area. Her theater credits include roles in the musicals You're a Good Man Charlie Brown, The Reluctant Dragon, Honk!, A Christmas Carol. Seussical, CinderEdna and Bat Boy. She has appeared in an independent film, and most recently, starred in a television commercial for the Minnesota Twins. At the Ordway Center

for the Arts, she appeared in a holiday run of The Sound of Music. She has been in several productions with the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra, including Menotti's Amahl and the Night Visitors and Dr. Seuss' Gertrude McFuzz. Kiana started out as a violinist at age four (bad career advice from her parents), then began vocal studies at 13. She currently attends school at the St. Paul Conservatory for Performing Artists, where she is enrolled in the musical theater program. Her hidden talent: riding a unicycle.

Michael Adams, viola

Michael Adams has carved out a unique career in music that has led down many roads; as a chamber musician, soloist, orchestral player, radio commentator and producer, host of the Minnesota Orchestra's "Adventures in Music" family concerts and — along with his wife Daria, the founding Artistic Director of Music in the Vineyards Festival. As MITV's concert commentator and emcee, his goal is to make music sound so interesting — with stories, explanations and analysis — that the audience can't wait to hear it. (This is usually accomplished by plagiarizing the work of others.)

Michael joined the Minnesota Orchestra's viola section in 1988, at the invitation of conductor Edo de Waart, after a successful stint as a music producer and host for classical WCAL-FM in Minneapolis/St. Paul, and later, for Minnesota Public Radio. He is proud of the fact that he was never fined by the FCC.

In recent seasons, Adams has performed as a quest with the Alcan Quartet of Canada, the Artaria Quartet of Boston and The Chamber Music Society of Minnesota and with visiting musicians such as violinist Gil Shaham, and pianist Garrick Ohlsson.

Michael attended both the Eastman School of Music in Rochester NY and The Mannes College of Music in NYC, escaping largely unscathed by the discipline of academia. He has been a member of the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra, the Denver Chamber Orchestra, the Colorado Springs Symphony, the Tulsa Philharmonic and, most importantly, the Santa Fe Opera Orchestra, where he met his future wife — violinist Daria Tedeschi — down in the deep, dark orchestra pit. (True story!)

He is the father to three children, ages 15, 13 and 11, who would be astonished to learn that anyone would be willing to pay to hear their father talk. Michael is an avid bicyclist, enjoys canoe camping in Minnesota's Boundary Waters, sailing with friends on Lake Superior and planning fantasy vacation trips with his collection of maps.

Dale Barltrop, violin

Dale has held the position of Principal Second Violin in the St Paul Chamber Orchestra since 2003. Hailing from Brisbane, Australia, Dale came to the U.S. in 1998 to study at the University of Maryland, he went on to continue his studies at the Cleveland Institute of Music. Dale has appeared as soloist with the Maryland Chamber Orchestra, the Bloomington Symphony Orchestra and back home with the Queensland Symphony and Queensland Pops Orchestras. Dale was a grand prizewinner at the 2003 Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition. His quartet was ensemble-inresidence at the Yellow Barn Chamber Music Festival in Vermont, Dale has participated in many festivals including Mainly Mozart, Tanglewood and the New York String Orchestra Seminar.

Margaret Batjer, violin

Margaret made her first solo appearance at the age of 15 with the Chicago Symphony in Gian Carlo Menotti's Violin Concerto. Since then, she has been re-engaged by the Chicago Symphony, as well as the orchestras of Philadelphia, St. Louis, Seattle and Dallas. Margaret has also appeared as a soloist throughout Europe with the Chamber Orchestra of Europe, the Prague Chamber Orchestra, the Halle Orchestra and the Berlin Symphony. Margaret has performed at the Marlboro Music Festival, the Vancouver Chamber Music Festival, the Sarasota Festival, and the Naples and Cremona festivals in Italy. Margaret has made numerous recordings of chamber music. In 2005, Margaret joined the faculty of the Thornton School of Music at USC.

Ara Gregorian, viola

*ADOPTED BY W. BARTON BERG

Equally accomplished as soloist and chamber musician. Ara made his debut with the Boston Pops Orchestra in 1997 and his New York recital debut in 1996. He has made chamber music appearances at New York's Alice Tully Hall, Avery Fisher Hall, and Carnegie Hall, and has appeared as soloist with the Shanghai, Lansing, Pueblo, Michigan State, and Las Cruces Symphony Orchestras. Ara is the founder and Artistic Director of the Four Seasons Chamber Music Festival and has performed at the Santa Fe, Skaneateles, and Strings in the Mountains music festivals. He has recorded for NPR. New York's WQXR. and the Kleos label, and is a member of the chamber music ensemble. Concertante. Ara received his degrees from The Juilliard School and is Associate Professor of Violin/Viola at East Carolina University.

Randall Hodgkinson, piano

Grand Prize Winner of the International American Music Competition sponsored by Carnegie Hall and the Rockefeller Foundation, Randall has performed with orchestras in Atlanta, Philadelphia, Buffalo, Boston, and abroad in Italy and Iceland. He has performed numerous recital programs spanning the repertoire from J.S. Bach to Donald Martino. He is an artist member of the Boston Chamber Music Society, and performs the four-hand and two-piano repertoire with his wife Leslie Amper. Randall appears at numerous festivals and he is presently on the faculty of the New

England Conservatory of Music in Boston, and the Longy School of Music in Cambridge. Randall gave the world premiere of the Piano Concerto by Gardner Read at the Eastman School, released on Albany Records.

Qing Hou, violin

A native of China, Qing Hou began studying the violin at an early age, and by 12 she was selected to study at the Central Conservatory of Music in Beijing. In 1988 she came to the U.S. to study at the Peabody Conservatory and the New England Conservatory. Hou began her professional career with the San Francisco Symphony. In 1997 Daniel Barenboim appointed her to the Chicago Symphony. Also active as a chamber musician, Hou performed a series of concerts in Germany with members of the Saarbrücken Radio Orchestra, and has toured Switzerland, Italy, and France, She has appeared throughout California as a member of Trio Phoenix and has performed at chamber music festivals in El Paso. Sarasota, and Sun Vallev.

Joseph Johnson, cello

Following eleven years with the Minnesota Orchestra, Joseph recently became principal cello of the Milwaukee Symphony. Joseph is active as a chamber musician, festival performer and educator. In Minnesota he performed numerous chamber music works during the Minnesota Orchestra Sommerfest, both as a cellist and pianist. He was a founding member of the Prospect Park Players chamber ensemble and the Minneapolis Quartet. A graduate of the Eastman School of Music, Joseph earned his master's from Northwestern University, Chicago. In 2002 he was invited to the 12th International Tchaikovsky Competition, (Moscow), advancing to the semifinal round.

Erin Keefe, violin

*ADOPTED BY MARY AND NICHOLAS GRAVES Winner of the 2006 Avery Fisher Career Grant, Erin is also a top prizewinner of several Inter-

national Competitions. She recently took the Grand Prizes in the 2007 Torun International Violin Competition (Poland), the 2006 Schadt Competition and the Corpus Chirsti International String Competition. Erin has appeared with the New Mexico Symphony, the New York City Ballet Orchestra, the Amadeus Chamber Orchestra and has given recitals throughout the United States, Europe and Asia. She has collaborated with many of today's leading artists, including the Emerson String Quartet, Roberto and Andres Diaz, Edgar Mever, Richard Goode, Gary Hoffman, Leon Fleisher and William Preucil. Her recording credits include works by Schoenberg for Naxos and works by Mozart, Dvóřak and Bartok for Deutsche Gramophone.

Aaron Jay Kernis, piano

Winner of the coveted 2002 Grawemeyer Award for Music Composition and one of the youngest composers ever to be awarded the Pulitzer Prize, Aaron Jay Kernis is among the most esteemed musical figures of his generation. With his "fearless originality [and] powerful voice" (The New York Times), each new Kernis work is eagerly awaited by audiences and musicians alike. His works figure prominently on orchestral, chamber, and recital programs around the world. He has been commissioned by many of America's foremost performers including Renee Fleming, Joshua Bell and Christopher O'Riley and major institutions such as the New York Philharmonic, American Public Radio, Aspen Music Festival and the Philadelphia Orchestra. Aaron studied at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music, and Manhattan and Yale Schools of Music, working with composers as diverse as John Adams, Charles Wuorinen and Jacob Druckman. He first came to national attention in 1982 with the acclaimed premiere of his first orchestral work, dream of the morning sky, by the New York Philharmonic. His works have been recorded on Nonesuch, New Albion. and Argo.

Sarah Lewis, cello

*ADOPTED BY BRUCE AND MARTHA ATWATER Sarah Lewis is currently in her ninth season with The Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra. Previously Sarah was a member of Milwaukee Symphony and has performed with the Minnesota Orchestra and the Los Angeles Philharmonic. She has appeared as soloist and chamber musician with the SPCO and gave the U.S. premiere of Malcolm Forsyth's Eclectic Suite for Cello and Piano with Lydia Artymiw. An avid chamber musician, she has performed recitals in New York, Los Angeles, San Francisco, and the Twin Cities, Sarah has been featured at the Alexandria Festival of the Lakes in Minnesota and is an adjunct professor of cello at St. Thomas University.

Evelyne Luest, piano

Evelyne Luest is an accomplished soloist and chamber musician and has performed in Europe, South America, Asia and the USA. She has won the Artists International Competition in New York as well as many awards with her ensemble, Contrasts Quartet. Evelyne has performed as soloist at Weill Hall at Carnegie Hall, the Spoleto Festival of Two Worlds in Italy and on the St. Paul Sunday National Radio Show. Her many collaborations include such noted musicians as cellist Truls Mork and flutist Emmanuel Pahud. Her long list of premieres includes compositions by Ned Rorem, Joan Tower, Jing Jing Iuo, Aaron Jay Kernis, and Ben Weber. She lives in New York City with her husband, Aaron Jay Kernis, and their two children.

Vera Mariner, soprano

Combining a rich, captivating voice and a fearless theatrical energy, actress Vera Mariner has delighted audiences of all ages with her fun-loving, over-the-top performances in Hansel and Gretel, Green Eggs and Ham and Gertrude McFuzz with the orchestras of Boston, Cleveland, Cincinnati, Syracuse, Utah, Houston, Minnesota and Roanoke. She recently made her Carnegie Hall debut with

the Orchestra of St. Luke's conducted by John Morris Russell. Her wonderful rapport with children has resulted in an ongoing relationship with the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra's educational division as developer and host of the family series *Xplorchestra*. In 2006 she was recognized as Artist-in-Residence with the internationally acclaimed male choir, *Cantus*. An award winning costume designer, Vera lends her designs to theater companies in The Twin Cities. Vera is thrilled to spend time in the Napa Valley as this is on her "bucket list" of things to see in her lifetime.

Lawrence Neuman, viola

*ADOPTED BY JOHN AND BECLEE WILSON

Lawrence has been a member of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra since 1991. Before coming to Chicago, he was violist with the Miami String Quartet, Winner at the 1988 Lionel Tertis International Viola Competition. Neuman has performed as soloist with the National Repertory Orchestra, the National Orchestra of Costa Rica, the Kammergild Chamber Orchestra, and the Eastman-Dryden Orchestra. As a chamber musician, he is heard frequently throughout the Chicago area and has performed throughout the United States and Europe. He has been heard at festivals in Marlboro, La Jolla, Madison, Portland, and Davenport and has collaborated with such artists as Daniel Barenboim. Pinchas Zukerman, Gil Shaham, and Aaron Rosand. He and his wife, violinist Qing Hou, live in Chicago with their son Maurice.

Nokuthula Ngwenyama, viola

Nokuthula came to international attention when she won both the Primrose Competition and the Young Concert Artists International Auditions at age 17. Plaudits followed her debut recitals and in 1997 she received the Avery Fisher Career Grant. She has appeared with many orchestras including the Los Angeles Philharmonic, the Charlotte Symphony, the New Jersey Philharmonic, the Louisiana Philharmonic, Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra and the KwaZulu Natal Philharmonic Orchestra

tra in South Africa. Nokuthula (or just plain 'Tula to her friends) is no stranger to television and radio. A vivid portrait of her was televised nationally on CBS Sunday Morning and she was featured on the Emmy Award-nominated PBS program Sound of Strings. A dedicated advocate for the arts, she has testified before Congress on behalf of the National Endowment for the Arts.

Sally Pendlebury, cello

*ADOPTED BY BARBARA INSEL

Sally grew up in Manchester, England where she attended Chetham's School of Music. She then went on to study at the Guildhall School of Music and won scholarships to further her studies in Dusseldorf and Boston. She is a member of the Chamber Orchestra of Europe and has performed and recorded with many of the great soloists and conductors of today. She was a founding member of the Vellinger String Quartet and toured with them regularly throughout Europe, Japan and the USA. Later this year she will be performing chamber music in New York, Nürnberg and Graz. Sally has performed as the guest principal cellists with the London Sinfonietta, English Chamber Orchestra, Liverpool Philharmonic, BBC Scottish, Scottish Chamber Orchestra and the Philharmonia Orchestra. She lives in London with her husband, the Scottish oboist and conductor Douglas Boyd and their two children.

Scott Pingel, bass

Wisconsin native, Scott Pingel began playing the double bass at age 17 because of a strong interest in jazz, Latin, and classical music. In 2004, at age 29, he became Principal Bass of the San Francisco Symphony, Previously, he served as principal bass of the Charleston Symphony, performed with the Metropolitan Opera, the Boston Symphony at Tanglewood, and the Metamorphosen Chamber Orchestra, and served as quest principal with the National Arts Centre Orchestra of Canada. In addition to his experience in classical music, Scott has worked with jazz greats including

Michael Brecker, Geoff Keezer, and James Williams, performed with pop icon Madonna, and played in an opening act for Tito Puente. Scott is now on the Collegiate Faculty at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music.

Robert Rinehart, viola

*ADOPTED BY PETER AND WILLINDA MCCREA

Robert, a member of the New York Philharmonic, is a familiar figure on the New York chamber music scene. A founding member of the Ridge String Quartet, he has performed in every major music center in the United States, as well as in Europe, South America. Canada, Australia and Asia, and has collaborated with Benny Goodman, Rudolf Firkusny, and the Guarneri String Quartet, among many others. He has appeared at numerous festivals including the Spoleto Festival, the Vancouver Chamber Music Festival, the Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival and the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center. His recordings have received a Grammy Award, two Grammy nominations and the Diapason d'Or. A native of San Francisco. Robert studied violin there and at the Curtis Institute of Music. He is a member of the faculty of the Manhattan School of Music.

Anja Strauss, soprano

*ADOPTED BY JOHN AND ULLA BROWN

German soprano Anja has established herself as one of the most sought-after sopranos in the Bay area. Her operatic roles include Gretel (Hansel and Gretel), Oscar (Un Ballo In Maschera), Blonde (Abduction from the Seraglio), Despina (Così fan tutte) and Clorinda (La Cenerentola). She has sung with Sacramento Opera, Pacific Repertory Opera and the German companies of Lübeck, Kiel Potsdam and Detmold. Most recently she appeared as the "Governess" in Britten's Turn of the Screw with Oakland Opera and San Francisco Lyric Opera. In addition to opera, Anja has performed a vast repertoire of sacred music and is a passionate Lied Singer. Anja enjoys collaborating with contemporary composers, as in the recent world premiere of Kirke Mechem's opera *Pride and Prejudice*. She serves on the faculties of the San Francisco Conservatory's Preparatory Division/Adult Extension and St. Mary's College.

Axel Strauss, violin

*ADOPTED BY JOHN AND ULLA BROWN

In 1998, Axel became the first German artist ever to win the Naumburg Foundation Prize in Violin and in the seasons since, he has been equally acclaimed for his virtuosity and his musical sensitivity. He has lived in the United States since 1996 and serves as Professor of Violin at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music. He has been heard on concert stages throughout Europe since his recital debut in Hamburg in 1988 and his concerto debut with the Neubrandenburg Philharmonic two years later. Amongst Axel's recent recordings BP Olive released his performance of the Brahms violin concerto with the Budapest Philharmonic and Amadeus Press issued a DVD featuring Axel Strauss in concert at Steinway Hall in New York City. Axel Strauss performs on a rare violin made by J. F. Pressenda of Turin 1845, on extended loan through the generosity of the Stradivari Society in Chicago.

Jeffrey Sykes, piano

*ADOPTED BY NANCY AUSTIN AND BILL POLLACEK MITV is delighted to welcome Jeffrey back this year after his highly successful role as guest artistic director in 2007. Acclaimed by the Frankfurter Allgemeine Zeitung as "a commanding solo player, the most supportive of accompanists, and a leader in chamber music," Jeffrey has performed throughout the United States, Canada, Mexico, and Western Europe. Recent activities include a Carnegie Hall recital with flutist Stephanie Jutt under the auspices of the Pro Musicis Foundation and a live broadcast over WGBH, Boston Public Radio. Together with Ms. Jutt, Jeffrey is the founder and artistic director of the Bach Dancing and Dynamite Society of Wisconsin, a highly-acclaimed and innovative chamber music festival noted for integrating dance, drama, and visual art into the concert setting.

For the last ten years, Jeffrey has served as the Music Director of Opera for the Young, a professional opera company that gives more than 200 fully-staged performances a year to schoolchildren throughout the upper Midwest. This year, Jeffrey has joined with violinist Axel Strauss and cellist Jean-Michel Fonteneau to form the San Francisco Piano Trio.

David Tanenbaum, guitar

David is recognized internationally as an outstanding performing and recording artist and a charismatic educator who has performed world-wide. While his repertoire encompasses diverse styles, David is an eloquent proponent of new guitar repertoire. Among works written for him is Hans Werner Henze's quitar concerto An Eine Äolsharfe, Terry Riley's, Ascención and a suite by Lou Harrison. He has toured with Steve Reich and Musicians, was invited to Japan by Toru Takemitsu, and has had a long association with the Ensemble Modern. As a chamber musician he has collaborated with the Kronos, Alexander and Chester String Quartets, dancer Tandy Beal and guitarist Manuel Barrueco. He is a member of the World Guitar Ensemble, which regularly tours Europe and is Chair of the Guitar Department at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music.

Roger Tapping, viola

Roger was a member of the acclaimed Takács Quartet for ten years during which time their international career included Beethoven and Bartok Cycles in the U.S., Europe, Japan and Australia. Their recordings for DECCA/ London, have won numerous awards including a Grammy, three Gramophone Awards. three Japan Record Academy Chamber Music Awards and a Classical Brits Award. In London. Roger played in a number of Britain's leading chamber ensembles before joining Britain's longest established guartet, the Allegri Quartet. He taught at the Royal Academy of Music in London, was principal viola of the London Mozart Players, a member of the English Chamber Orchestra and a founding member of the Chamber Orchestra of Europe. Roger is now on the faculties of the New England Conservatory, the Longy School and The Boston Conservatory.

Tanva Tomkins, cello

*ADOPTED BY LYN AND CARL THORSEN

Tanva, a virtuoso on both the Baroque and modern cello, is equally at home playing a Bach cello suite in an intimate house concert or anchoring the cello section of the internationally renowned Philharmonia Baroque Orchestra. Living in Europe for 14 years, Tanya studied in the Netherlands, and went on to immerse herself in the study of early music, particularly the Baroque period. She founded the Trio d'Amsterdam, which toured extensively throughout Europe and subsequently made its New York debut at the Frick Collection concert series. Tanva is equally fluent in the modern cello repertoire as a member of the Euridice String Quartet and the SoLaRe Trio. Tanva's passion for chamber music of all kinds has led her to organize a successful series of house concerts in the San Francisco Bay Area. Her aim is to engage people more immediately, profoundly, intensely, and meaningfully in the experience of listening to and appreciating chamber music in the more intimate settings for which much of it was originally composed.

Bion Tsang, cello

*ADOPTED BY CAROLYN THATCHER

Internationally recognized as one of the outstanding instrumentalists of his generation, Bion Tsang has performed as a soloist with the major orchestras of the world: in New York. Moscow, Hong Kong, Taiwan, Atlanta and the National Symphony in Washington DC. Recent highlights include giving the U.S. premiere of the Enescu Symphonie Concertante and the U.S. premiere of Tan Dun's Crouching Tiger Concerto for Cello Solo and Chamber Orchestra. Bion's chamber music career is also a distinguished one, marked by collaborations with violinists Pamela Frank, Jaime Laredo and Kyoko Takezawa, violist Michael Tree, cellist Yo-Yo Ma, bassist Gary Karr and pianist Leon Fleisher. He performs at many festivals including the Laurel Festival of the Arts, where he served as Artistic Director for ten years.

Ösmo Vänskä, clarinet

Finnish conductor Ösmo Vänskä became the Minnesota Orchestra's music director in September 2003. During his tenure he has been named Conductor of the Year by Musical America and in 2004 embarked on a five year project to record the complete Beethoven symphonies with the Minnesota Orchestra. Vänskä began his music career as a clarinetist, ascending to the co-principal chair of the Helsinki Philharmonic. He studied conducting with Jorma Panula at Finland's Sibelius Academy and went on to become principal conductor of the Lahti Symphony. while also serving as music director of the Iceland Symphony Orchestra and the Tapiola Sinfonietta. Later. Vänskä served as chief conductor of the BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra. Ösmo has received many honors and distinctions including a Royal Philharmonic Society Award for his outstanding contribution to classical music.

Ryo Yanagitani, piano

Ryo Yanagitani has distinguished himself as one of Canada's most promising young concert artists, garnering the silver medal at the Vina del Mar International Piano Competition in Chile, where he also won the audience prize. Ryo has made concerto appearances with the Vancouver Symphony, the Montreal Metropolitan Orchestra, Edmonton Symphony and Minnesota Orchestra among others. Ryo is also in demand as a chamber musician. performing in a wide range of settings, from the duo sonata repertoire to large ensembles. Ryo is currently working towards the Doctor of Musical Arts Degree at the Yale School of Music.

Amos Yang, cello

Amos Yang was recently appointed to the position of Assistant Principal Cello of the San Francisco Symphony. He has performed as soloist and chamber musician worldwide, at the Aspen Music Festival, the American Academy in Rome, Wigmore Hall, London and Alice Tully Hall in New York City. Mr. Yang holds Bachelor and Master of Music degrees from The Juilliard School.

To commemorate Felix Mendelssohn's 200th birthday, the Cypress and the Library of Congress have co-commissioned a new quartet from composer Kevin Puts. Paired with Mendelssohn and Beethoven quartets, Puts' work will premiere in February 2009 at the Library as part of the "Mendelssohn on the Mall" project in conjunction with the National Gallery and the Smithsonian Museum. Since its inception the CSQ has reached over 100,000 students through its educational activities. In 2004, the CSQ was awarded the McGraw-Hill Companies' Sherman Award to honor its commitment to education.
