

Festival Artist Biographies

Daria Adams, violin

Violinist Daria Adams, the founding Artistic Director of *Music in the Vineyards* Festival along with her husband Michael, is a member of the world-renowned Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra. Since joining the SPCO in 1987, she has traveled the world on tours to Asia, Europe and across North America. An ardent Baroque music performer, Daria is a founding member of the Blue Baroque Band, a featured ensemble-in-residence at MITV this year.

Daria has been a guest at many prominent music festivals: in Newport, Rhode Island; Banff, Alberta, Canada; the Cactus Pear Festival in Texas; the Bach Dancing and Dynamite Society; the Festival de Musica Rondena and in Lyon, France and Vaasa, Finland.

Daria holds degrees in Violin Performance from the New England Conservatory and the State University of New York at Stonybrook. A big opera fan, Daria spent four years playing in the Santa Fe Opera Orchestra, where she also took an interest in a musician sitting in the back of the pit, one Michael Adams. Cléa Galhano, recorder

Brazilian recorder player Cléa Galhano is an internationally renowned performer of early, contemporary and Brazilian music. Cléa has performed in the U.S., Canada, South America and Europe as a chamber musician and a soloist, collaborating with other recorder players such as Marion Verbruggen, Jacques Ogg, and Belladonna. Among other important music festivals, Ms. Galhano has performed at the Boston Early Music Festival, the Tage Alter Music Festival in Germany, Wigmore Hall in London, Merkin Hall in New York and Palazzo Santa Croce in Rome. She was featured in 2006 in the Second International Recorder Congress in Leiden, Holland and in 2007 at the International Recorder Conference in Montreal. Currently, Cléa is the Executive Artistic Director of the St. Paul Conservatory of Music and she is on the faculty of Macalester College. She has recordings available on Dorian, Ten Thousand Lakes and Eldorado labels, and is the Music Director of the Recorder Orchestra of the Midwest.

Kathryn Greenbank, oboe

Kathryn Greenbank has been Principal Oboist of The Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra since 1982 and is a graduate of the Curtis Institute of Music. Kathryn is a frequent soloist with the SPCO and has been featured on many of their recordings. With the SPCO. she gave the world premiere performance of American composer Jennifer Higdon's Oboe Concerto, which was commissioned for her by the Minnesota Commissioning Club. Next season Burt will perform as acting Principal Clarinet with the New York Philharmonic.

Dawn Harms, violin

Dawn Harms leads an active musical life as a violinist, violist, chamber musician, and conductor. A member of the San Francisco Opera Orchestra and associate concertmaster of the New Century Chamber Orchestra, Dawn also performs as co-concertmaster with the Oakland East Bay Symphony. Last summer Dawn was chosen to be one of the fellows at the exclusive American Academy of Conducting at the Aspen Music Festival. She is the co-founder and music director of the Music at Kirkwood chamber music faculty at Stanford University. Dawn was conductor and music director of the Amarillo Youth Orchestra and continues to design and perform educational concerts throughout the U.S. Dawn's recent solo appearances include Symphony Parnassus in the Herbst Theatre, Master Sinfonia Chamber Orchestra, the Folsom Symphony, the Paradise Symphony, the Flagler Symphony in Florida, and the Stanford Symphony Orchestra. Qing Hou has been a member of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra since 1997. A native of China, Hou studied at the Central Conservatory in Beijing before coming to the U.S. in 1988 to study at the Peabody Conservatory and the New England Conservatory. Prior to her tenure in Chicago she was a member of the San Francisco Symphony. An avid chamber musician, Hou has performed for the Andover Chamber Music Society and at festivals in Madison, Napa, El Paso, and Sun Valley as well as in Europe. She and her husband, violist Lawrence Neuman, are founding members of the Chicago-based Lincoln String Quartet.

As a soloist, Qing Hou has appeared with orchestras in Boston, Baltimore, Chicago, and China. In 2003 she made her solo debut with the Chicago Symphony, performing Mozart's Violin Concerto in G major conducted by Daniel Barenboim.

Layton James, harpsichord

Layton James, known as Skip to friends and colleagues, has been Principal Keyboardist with The Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra since 1969. Tessa Lark, violin (klein)

Nokuthula Ngwenyama, viola

Nokuthula Ngwenyama came to international attention when she won the Primrose Competition and the Young Concert Artists International Auditions at age 17. Plaudits followed her debut recitals in Washington. D.C. and in New York and in 1997 she received the prestigious Avery Fisher Career Grant. She has appeared with many orchestras including The Charlotte Symphony, the New Jersey Philharmonic, the Louisiana Philharmonic, the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center, the Rochester Philharmonic. the KwaZulu Natal Philharmonic Orchestra in Durban, South Africa, as well as Esa-Pekka Salonen and the Los Angeles Philharmonic. Nokuthula performed at the White House to commemorate the 10th anniversary of NPR's Performance Today, which also featured artists Wynton Marsalis, James Galway, and Murray Perahia. A vivid portrait of Nokuthula was televised nationally on CBS Sunday Morning and she was featured on the Emmy Award-nominated PBS program Sound of Strings. She joined the faculty of Indiana University as visiting professor for the 2008-09 academic year and currently serves as director of the Primrose International Viola Competition.

Scott Pingel, bass

Scott Pingel began playing the double bass at age 17 because of a strong interest in jazz, Latin, and classical music. In 2004, at age 29. he became Principal Bass of the San Francisco Symphony. Previously, he served as principal bass of the Charleston Symphony Orchestra, performed with the Metropolitan Opera, the Boston Symphony Orchestra at Tanglewood, and the Metamorphosen Chamber Orchestra, and served as quest principal with the National Arts Centre Orchestra of Canada. Beth Rapier, cello

Ross has twice been awarded the McKnight Artist Award, once for solo performance, and once as a Duo with his wife, cellist Beth Rapier. They have two children, Eli (12) a trumpet player, and Erin (16) a ballet dancer.

Christina Smith, flute

A native of Sonoma County, California, Christina Smith began her flute studies when she was seven. She has appeared as soloist with many orchestras in Northern California, including the San Francisco Symphony at the age of 15. She is a graduate of Interlochen Arts Academy, and the Curtis Institute of Music. Appointed principal flutist of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra at the age of 20, Ms. Smith has appeared as soloist with the ASO many times, performing works by Mozart, Vivaldi, Bach, Bizet, Rodrigo, Ibert, Nielsen, John Corigliano, Christopher Rouse, and Kaija Saariaho. Axel Strauss, violin

The first German artist to ever win the international Naumburg Violin Award in New York, Axel Strauss has been equally acclaimed for his virtuosity and his musical sensitivity. He has performed as soloist with orchestras in Budapest, Hamburg, New York, Seoul, Shanghai, Bucharest, San Francisco and Cincinnati, among others. He has collaborated with conductors such as Maxim Shostakovitch. Rico Saccani. Joseph Silverstein, and Alasdair Neale. Mr. Strauss frequently performs at various music festivals in the US. and abroad, taking him to Germany, India, Korea and Japan. At the age of seventeen he won the silver medal at the Enescu Competition in Romania and has been recognized with many other awards, including top prizes in the Bach, Wieniawski and Kocian competitions. Axel has been residing in the United States since 1996. He maintains a busy performance schedule and serves as Professor of Violin at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music.

Axel Strauss performs on an outstanding violin by J.F. Pressenda, Turin 1845, on extended loan through the generous efforts of the Stradivari Society in Chicago.

Jeffrey Sykes, piano

His performances have been frequently broadcast on National Public Radio and he has a discography including eleven CDs published by various labels.

Together with Stephanie Jutt, Dr. Sykes is the founder and artistic director of the *Bach Dancing and Dynamite Society* of Wisconsin, a highly-acclaimed and innovative chamber music festival now in its nineteenth season. He is a regular guest artist in the *Cactus Pear Music Festival* and a founding member of the *Painted Sky Festival*. Last year, Jeffrey joined with violinist Axel Strauss and cellist Jean-Michel Fonteneau to form the San Francisco Piano Trio.

For the last eleven years, Jeffrey has served as the Music Director of Opera for the Young. He works extensively as a vocal coach throughout the US, teaches and coaches at the University of California at Berkeley and California State University-East Bay, and recently completed his third guest teaching residency at the University of Houston. Tanya Tomkins, cello

Cellist Tanya Tomkins returned to the US in 1998 after living in Holland for 14 years, where she toured and recorded extensively as a chamber musician. The first cellist ever to win the international Bodky Competition for Early Music Soloists, she is equally at home on baroque and modern instruments and has performed on many chamber music series to critical acclaim, including at the Frick Collection, Lincoln Center, the 92nd Street Y, San Francisco Performances, and the Concertgebouw Kleine Zaal.

Currently one of Philharmonia Baroque and Portland Baroque's principal cellists, she has performed as soloist with both orchestras. She also performs with the American Bach Soloists, the Oregon Bach Festival, Olympic Chamber Music Festival, and the Moab Chamber Music Festival. She is a member of the Tomkins-Zivian Duo, the Left Coast Chamber Ensemble and the San Francisco String Trio. She also organizes a series of house concerts in Berkeley and Marin County.

Charles Ullery, bassoon

ADOPTED BY LEE TRUCKER & HENRIETTA COHEN Charles Ullerv has been principal bassoonist of the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra since 1975. Prior to that, he was a member of the San Francisco Symphony and the Sixth Army Band at the Presidio in San Francisco. Many composers have written works for him, including Michael Daugherty, Daniel Sturm, Russell Platt, Jay Reise, William Wallace, Erika Foin, Akmal Parwez and Daniel S. Godfrey, Ullery has appeared at many festivals including Sarasota, Utah, Rockport, Aspen, Carnegie Hall and, from 1976 to 2008 as principal bassoonist of the Grand Teton Music Festival Orchestra. He spent the 1987-88 season as a faculty member at Oberlin College, and the 2008-9 school year as a visiting lecturer at Indiana University. Ullery graduated with honors in mathematics from the University of Arizona at age 19, and started graduate work in math at UCLA before entering the Army in 1969. Amos Yang, cello

An avid chamber musician, Wei-Yi has performed with members of some of the world's finest ensembles and orchestras including the New York, Phildelphia, Chicago, San Francisco, Saint Paul Chamber Orchestras, the London Symphony, Singapore Symphony, Orquestra do Estado de Sao Paulo, and Lincoln Center Chamber Music Society II. Born in Taiwan of Chinese and Japanese heritage, Mr. Yang was first educated in England and then at the Manhattan School of Music. He was awarded a doctorate by Yale in 2004 and appointed to the piano faculty in 2005. Mr. Yang co-founded the award-winning Soyulla Ensemble, which recently debuted at Alice Tully Hall, toured Korea, and released a CD on the Renegade Classics label. Mr. Yang's performances have been featured around the globe via international television, radio, and web broadcasting media.

Phillip Ying, viola

Phillip Ying, as violist of the Ying Quartet, has performed across the US, Europe and Asia. He is a recipient of the Naumburg Award for Chamber Music and has been awarded a Grammy for a collaborative recording with the Turtle Island String Quartet. He maintains a vital interest in new music with recent and planned premieres of works by Chen Yi, Augusta Read Thomas, Kevin Puts, Ned Rorem, Jennifer Higdon, Sebastian Currier, Paquito D'Rivera, and Lowell Liebermann. Phillip also pursues creative projects across musical styles with other artists, currently including Billy Childs, Mike Seeger, and Tod Machover. During the summers, he has performed at the Marlboro, Tanglewood, Norfolk, Aspen, Bowdoin and Skaneateles music festivals. He has been recorded on the Telarc, Albany, Elektra, and EMI labels.

Phillip is an Assistant Professor of Viola and an Associate Professor of Chamber Music at the Eastman School of Music. He is currently president of Chamber Music America

Eric Zivian, piano

Eric Zivian was born in Michigan and grew up in Toronto, Canada, where he attended the Royal Conservatory of Music. After receiving a diploma there, he attended the Curtis Institute of Music and went on to receive graduate degrees from Juilliard and Yale. Eric has given solo recitals in Toronto, New York, Philadelphia, and the San Francisco Bay Area. He has performed Mozart and Beethoven concertos with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra and the Beethoven Triple Concerto with the Santa Rosa Symphony.

Since 2000, Mr. Zivian has performed extensively on original instruments. He is a member of the Zivian-Tomkins Duo, a fortepiano-cello duo and he is also a member of the Left Coast Chamber Ensemble and has performed with the Empyrean Ensemble and Earplay. He is a frequent guest artist on the San Francisco Conservatory's faculty chamber music series.

Eric's compositions have been performed widely in the U.S. and in Tokyo. He was awarded an ASCAP Jacob Druckman Memorial Commission to compose an orchestral work, *Three Character Pieces*, which was premiered by the Seattle Symphony in March 1998.

The Pacifica Quartet

(Simin Ganatra, Sibbi Bernhardsson, VIOLIN; Masumi Per Rostad, VIOLA; Brandon Vamos, CELLO)

Recognized for its virtuosity, exuberant performance style, and often daring repertory choices, the Pacifica Quartet has carved out a compelling musical path. This has been a remarkable season for the Quartet: in late November, Musical America named the group its 2009 "Ensemble of the Year." In addition, the Pacifica received the music industry's most coveted recognition, winning the Best Chamber Music Performance Grammy® Award for its acclaimed Naxos recording of Elliott Carter's String Quartets Nos. 1 & 5. Since the group first came together in 1994, the Pacifica Quartet has swept top awards in the U.S. and abroad, including the prestigious Avery Fisher Career Grant in 2006, making the Pacifica only the second chamber music ensemble ever to be selected.

In 2004, the Pacifica Quartet was appointed Faculty Quartet-in-Residence at the University of Illinois in Urbana-Champaign. The Quartet members also serve as resident performing artists at the University of Chicago and at the Longy School of Music in Boston.

Originating on the west coast, where it played many of its earliest concerts together, the Quartet takes its name from the aweinspiring Pacific Ocean. Throughout their journey as a string quartet, its members continually strive to be "Distinct as the billows/yet one as the sea." (James Montgomery)

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
