Daria Adams, violin & Artistic Director ARTISTIC DIRECTORS CHAIR SPONSORED BY SUSANNA AND MICHAEL STEINBERG

Violinist Daria Adams, the founding Co-Artistic Director of Music in the Vinevards, is a member of the world-renowned Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra (SPCO) where she has been featured in solo and chamber music performances. Since ioining the SPCO, she has traveled the world in tours to Asia, Europe and across North America. In 2017, the SPCO won a Grammy for Best Small Ensemble Performance with violinist Patricia Kopatchinskaja. At both MITV and the SPCO, Daria has earned a reputation for developing innovative concert presentations. Her "musical choreography" of both traditional and new music, has enhanced the listening experience in exciting ways. Daria has maintained a robust teaching studio over 25 years. She spent four years playing in the Santa Fe Opera Orchestra, where she took an interest in a musician lurking suspiciously in the back of the pit, her current husband. His interest remains mutual. She now lives in a suburban house, suddenly too large given her three departed children (ages 25, 23 and 21).

Violist Michael Adams has carved out a unique career that has lead down many roads: as a chamber musician, an orchestral player, writer on music, radio commentator and producer, host of the Minnesota Orchestra's Adventures in Music family concerts and-partnering with his violinist wife Daria—the founding Artistic Director of Music in the Vineyards. As MITV's concert commentator and emcee, his goal is to make the music sound so interesting - through insightful stories, musical explanations and analysis-that people cannot wait to hear it!

Michael joined the viola section of the Minnesota Orchestra in 1988 at the invitation of conductor Edo de Waart after a successful stint as a music producer and host for classical WCAL in Minneapolis/St. Paul, and later, for Minnesota Public Radio. Before landing in Minnesota, Michael ricocheted aimlessly through a number of different orchestras, such as the Rochester Philharmonic, the Oklahoma Symphony Orchestra, the Denver Chamber Orchestra, the Tulsa Philharmonic and the Santa Fe Opera. He is the father to three children, ages 25, 23 and 21 who are baffled that anyone would pay money to hear their father speak. Michael is an avid bicyclist, enjoys canoe camping in Minnesota's Boundary Waters Wilderness Area, sailing and planning fantasy vacation trips with his collection of maps. Born and raised in California, Robert has quickly become one of the most sought-after bassists on the West Coast. After completing his studies at UCLA and the San Francisco Conservatory, Robert won his first orchestral audition to become Principal Bass of the Marin Symphony. Robert has since become the Assistant Principal Bass of the Berkeley Symphony and performs with Symphony Napa Valley, The Monterey Symphony and Symphony Silicon Valley. Robert is a frequent guest with the San Francisco Symphony, Los Angeles Philharmonic and the Atlanta Symphony. He records regularly at Skywalker Ranch and can be heard on numerous films and video games.



Michael Brown, piano

Winner of a 2015 Avery Fisher Career Grant, Michael Brown has been described by The New York Times as a "young piano visionary" and "one of the leading figures in the current renaissance of performer-composers." Michael will soon make debut recitals in Berlin, Frankfurt, Antwerp, Zurich, Florence, and New York's 92nd Street Y. He recently joined the artist roster of The Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center's Chamber Music Two program where he performs with the Society in Alice Tully Hall and on tour. His recent schedule includes a performance with Seattle Symphony, a Carnegie Hall debut

with the New York Youth Symphony, recitals at Wigmore Hall, the Louvre, Alice Tully Hall, performances at the Marlboro, Ravinia, Caramoor, Mostly Mozart, Music@Menlo and Music in the Vineyards festivals as well as concerts with his regular collaborators: cellist Nicholas Canellakis and violinist Elena Urioste. Among his recent compositions: a Piano Concerto for the Maryland Symphony Orchestra and works for the Look & Listen Festival, Bargemusic, Concert Artists Guild, and Lincoln Center's Great Performers series. A native New Yorker, he is the First Prize Winner of the 2010 Concert Artists Guild Competition and was recently appointed Adjunct Assistant Professor of Piano at Brooklyn College.



Nicholas Canellakis, cello ADOPTED BY ANNA & BILL LEIGON

Hailed as a "superb young soloist" (The New Yorker), Nicholas Canellakis has become one of the most sought-after and innovative cellists of his generation, captivating audiences throughout the United States and abroad. In The New York Times his playing was praised as "impassioned" and "soulful, the audience seduced by his rich, alluring tone." In the spring of 2015, Nick made his Carnegie Hall debut with the American Symphony Orchestra. He on the artists roster of The Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center and a member of The Canellakis-Brown Duo. in which he collaborates with the pianist/composer Michael Brown. He has been featured at the festivals of Santa Fe, La Jolla, Music@Menlo, Ravinia, Verbier, Mecklenburg, Moab, Music in the Vineyards, Bridgehampton, Sarasota, Aspen and the Bargemusic series in New York City. Nicholas is on the faculty of the Brooklyn College Conservatory of Music and is the Co-Artistic Director of the Sedona Winter MusicFest in Arizona.

Within months of its inception in 2005, the remarkable Escher String Quartet came to the attention of key musical figures worldwide. Championed by the Emerson Quartet, the Escher was invited by both Pinchas Zukerman and Itzhak Perlman to be the Quartet-in-Residence at each artist's summer festival. In 2013 the quartet was awarded the prestigious Avery Fisher Career Grant. The Eschers have performed at the BBC Proms and are regular guests at Wigmore Hall in London. In its hometown of New York City, the quartet is on the artist roster of The Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center. The Escher Quartet takes its name from Dutch graphic artist M.C. Escher, inspired by Escher's method of interplay between individual components working together to form a whole.



Francisco Fullana, violin

The Spanish violinist Francisco Fullana, recipient of the 2018 Avery Fisher Career Grant, has been praised as a "rising star" (BBC Music Magazine) and "a paragon of delicacy" (San Francisco's Classical Voice), while his thoughtful virtuosity

has led to collaborations with such conducting greats as Gustavo Dudamel and the late Sir Colin Davis. Besides his many appearances as a soloist and his commitment to chamber music—he was invited to join the prestigious Lincoln Center Chamber Music Society Two roster in 2018, Francisco has made an impact as an innovative educator, having created the Fortissimo Youth Initiative, a series of baroque and classical music seminars and performances in partnership with youth and university orchestras, which explore and deepen young musicians' understanding of 18th-century music. A graduate of The Juilliard School and the University of Southern California, Francisco currently performs on the 1735 Mary Portman ex-Kreisler Guarneri del Gesù violin, on loan from Clement and Karen Arrison through the Stradivari Society of Chicago.



Ara Gregorian, violin

Ara is the Founding Artistic Director of the Four Seasons Chamber Music Festival in Greenville, North Carolina, which is celebrating its 15th Anniversary Season. Ara has appeared at the festivals of Santa Fe, Skaneateles, Bach Dancing and Dynamite Society, Cactus Pear, Bravo! Vail and Music in the Vineyards. Gregorian is the Four Seasons Chamber Music Festival Distinguished Professor of Violin at East Carolina University where he has been on the faculty since 1998. He is married to violinist Hve-Jin Kim.

Dawn Harms' diverse career trajectory has led her to many different roles: as violin soloist, concertmaster, chamber musician, and conductor. She records regularly at Skywalker Ranch Studios for movies and video games. She is the co-founder and music director of the Music at Kirkwood chamber music festival, and currently serves on the music faculty at Stanford University. Dawn was recently appointed music director and conductor of the Bay Area Rainbow Symphony. A strong advocate for music education, Dawn designs and performs her own entertaining family shows throughout the United States, New Zealand, and Japan. Dawn plays on her cousin Tom Waits' CDs "Alice" and "Blood Money. She also has two solo CDs, "The Black Swan" and "The Hot Canary".

The guartet has collaborated on related work with Music for Food, The Emerald Necklace Conservancy, the NPR show From The Top and other Boston-area projects. In addition to their upcoming Jordan Hall recital, Highland St. will present a series of concerts in April in Cape Cod in collaboration with From The Top.



Stephen Hinton

Stephen Hinton is the Avalon Foundation Professor in the Humanities at Stanford University, a Professor of Music and by courtesy, of German. From 2011-15 he served as the Denning Family Director of the Stanford Arts Institute, From 2006-10 he was Senior Associate Dean for Humanities & Arts. and from 1997-04 chairman of the Department of Music. Before Stanford, he taught at Yale University, and the Technische Universität Berlin prior to that. His principal research focuses on the music of German-speaking lands from the classical period through the present. His book Weill's Musical Theater: Stages of Reform, the first musicological study of Kurt Weill's complete stage works, won the 2013 Kurt Weill Prize for distinguished scholarship in musical theater. He is currently working on a series of online courses with the St. Lawrence String Quartet called Defining the String Quartet, which focuses on the music of Haydn and Beethoven.





Bixby Kennedy, clarinet

Clarinetist Bixby Kennedy has performed solo recitals, chamber music and orchestral concerts around the world. Hye-Jin has performed as soloist with the Philadelphia Orchestra, New Jersey Symphony Orchestra, BBC Concert Orchestra, Seoul Philharmonic Orchestra, Pan Asia Symphony of Hong Kong and the Hanover (Germany) Chamber Orchestra. where she led the ensemble in Mozart's A major Violin Concerto at age 12! She has appeared

at Carnegie Hall, the Kennedy Center, Kimmel Center, Salzburg's Mirabell Schloss, and in London at St. John's, Smith Square, and Wigmore Hall. Festival appearances include Marlboro, Ravinia, Music from Angel Fire, Music@Menlo, Bridgehampton, Music in the Vineyards and Prussia Cove. She is currently an Assistant Professor of Violin at East Carolina University in Greenville, NC. She is married to violinist Ara Gregorian.

The quartet took its name from the Spanish artist Joan Miró, whose surrealist works-with subject matter drawn from the realm of memory and imaginative fantasy-are some of the most original of the 20th century.



Dimitri Murrath, viola

Born in Brussels, Belgian-American violist Dimitri Murrath has made his mark as a soloist internationally, performing regularly in venues such as the Kennedy Center, the Royal Festival Hall and

Wigmore Hall in London, and around the globe from Tokyo to Paris. Dimitri has won numerous awards, including first prize at the Primrose International Viola Competition, second prize at the First Tokyo International Viola Competition. He is a recipient of a 2014 Avery Fisher Career Grant and released his first solo album last year. He attended the Yehudi Menuhin School, the Guildhall School of Music and Drama and graduated from the New England Conservatory of music. Following nine successful years of teaching at NEC, Dimitri is currently on the viola and chamber music faculty at San Francisco Conservatory of Music. He is an active participant in the Music for Food project—which raises awareness of the hunger problem faced by a large percent of the population—by creating important opportunities to experience the powerful role music can play as a catalyst for change.



Diana Newman, soprano

In 1998, she received the prestigious Avery Fisher Career Grant. Her eclectic performance schedule takes her all over the world, from appearances at Tokyo's Suntory Hall, to the Louvre, the Ford Center in Toronto, the Maison de Radio France, even appearing with Bruno Mars on Saturday Night Live.

Named the quartet-in-residence at Indiana University's Jacobs School of Music in March 2012, the Pacifica was also the Quartet-in-Residence at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York and received the 2009 Grammy Award for Best Chamber Music Performance. Formed in 1994, the Pacifica Quartet quickly won chamber music's top competitions, including the 1998 Naumburg Chamber Music Award and the prestigious Avery Fisher Career Grant in 2006.



Scott Pingel, bass

Maria Schneider, composer

Maria Schneider's music has been hailed by critics as "evocative, majestic, magical, heart-stoppingly gorgeous, and beyond categorization." She and her orchestra became widely known in 1994 when they released their first recording, *Evanescence*. The Maria Schneider Orchestra has performed at festivals and concert halls worldwide. Maria has received numerous commissions and guest-conducting invitations, working with over 85 groups from over 30 countries.

Schneider's music blurs the lines between genres, resulting in a long list of diverse commissioners, stretching from Jazz at Lincoln Center, to The Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, to David Bowie. She is among a small few to have received Grammys in both the jazz and classical categories, in addition to her collaboration with David Bowie. Maria and her orchestra have a distinguished recording legacy with twelve Grammy nominations and five Grammy awards. In 2012, her alma mater, the University of Minnesota, presented Maria with an honorary doctorate, and in 2014, ASCAP awarded her their esteemed Concert Music Award.



Jonah Sirota, viola

Jonah Sirota is a violist and composer dedicated to the imaginative performance of viola music, both original and preexisting. While the Chiara Quartet's performances were noteworthy for many reasons, chief among them was that they performed the major string quartet repertoire from memory! The group has been honored with a Grammy nomination, the ASCAP/CMA Adventurous Programming Award, the Guarneri Quartet Award, top prizes at the Paolo Borciani Competition and the Astral Artistic Services Audition, and a Gold Medal at the Fischoff Competition. In the 2015-2016 season, the Chiara Quartet was the resident ensemble at the Metropolitan Museum in New York, where the group returned for their farewell New York concert. An aspiring composer, Jonah has served on the faculty of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln Glenn Korff School of Music. at the Greenwood Summer Music Camp, and in masterclasses and residencies throughout the country.



Axel Strauss, violin

Axel Strauss has performed as soloist with orchestras in Budapest, Hamburg, New York, Seoul, Shanghai, Bucharest, San Francisco and Cincinnati, among others, and has toured widely throughout the world as a recitalist and chamber musician. In 2012 Axel was appointed Professor of Violin at the Schulich School of Music at McGill University in Montreal, where he also serves as Chair of the String Department.

An avid chamber musician, Becky has played with many renowned artists, including Isaac Stern, Yo-Yo Ma, Emanuel Ax, Edgar Meyer and Pamela Frank. She appears with the New York Philharmonic Ensembles and has performed with the Cape Cod Chamber Music Festival, the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center and the Boston Symphony Chamber Players. Becky was first introduced to classical music by her parents, who took her to hear the New York Philharmonic's Young People's Concerts led by Leonard Bernstein.
