It is with great sadness that Music in the Vineyards marks the passing of one of our longtime patrons and supporters, Warren Kenneth Nelson.

Warren's wife, Maritza Nelson has shared with us some of the landmarks of Warren's very full life in the Napa Valley and their reasons for being members of the Maestro Circle:

Warren demonstrated his service to community through his exemplary leadership as councilman and mayor of the town of Yountville from 1980 to 1986. Through his years on the Town Council he worked diligently to address the concerns and needs of the residents, improving the quality of life for future generations.

He was the founder of Families Together. For over 12 years, Warren organized monthly excursions for Napa County families to attend free-of-charge great concerts, Giants baseball games, science museums, circuses, zoos, and so much more.

Warren had a generous heart. His outgoing inclusive nature endeared him to all and earned the respect and admiration of those lucky to know him. Professionally, as a financial advisor, Warren excelled. He received many honors. However, what mattered most to him was the well-being of his clients. He treated every client like a dear friend.

Warren leaves behind a close, loving family. He had been given extra years of life



thanks to a lung transplant. He had a gift of making the most of every moment of every day. His enthusiasm and laughter live on in those of us who loved him. People usually described Warren as "one of a kind" and "larger than life."

Warren was a connoisseur of joy. He lived by the motto: Carpe Diem. He loved classical music. A Puccini aria always made him cry. Warren and Maritza have been passionate fans of MITV for over 26 years, and have rarely missed a concert. Now that Warren has passed away, Maritza is bringing their children and grandchildren to MITV concerts. It is a grand way to keep Warren's spirit alive.

Warren served on the MITV board and always stressed the importance of legacy giving. MITV has added such joy to all our lives that it is only natural that we all ensure its existence for many years to come, for ourselves and for future generations.

In Loving Memory of Matthew James Golden 1935-2022

We are deeply saddened with the loss of much-loved. loval Music in the Vinevards family member Matthew Golden earlier this year. Matthew along with his wife Anne, was a passionate and generous supporter of Music in the Vineyards for many years. In addition to Anne's leadership on the Music in the Vinevards Board of Directors. Matthew and Anne committed to making a major donation each year in support of the festival and its programs. Beginning in 2006, the Goldens began underwriting the Kitchens in the Vinevards annual fundraiser with First Republic Bank. Every year since then, they have made a major gift to Music in the Vineyards. This past December. Matthew and Anne donated \$25.000 as the Lead Sponsors of Music in the Vinevards' Icons of Design fundraising event at Inglenook honoring Robilee Frederick Deane and Molly Chappellet. "We love Music in the Vineyards and want to see it return year after year," says Anne Golden of their loyal commitment.

Matthew James Golden, Jr. passed away peacefully with his family at his side on April 13, 2022 at his home in Rutherford, California in the Napa Valley.

Matt's love of sports manifested itself in playing basketball at LaSalette Seminary where he scored fifty points in one game at the University of Connecticut, Hartford. His passion for golf



led to playing golf courses around the world as well as Napa Valley Country Club. Matt rarely missed a televised game of the SF Giants. SF 49ers or Golden State Warriors. Matt's Irish sense of humor. a glass of wine, and smiling babies brought him much joy as did his love of the out-of-doors, hiking, skiing and beautiful sunsets.

Matt worked as a consultant in the field of public administration. Early in his career he and his wife spent time working for USAID in Amman, Jordan from which they were evacuated soon after the end of the Six Day War in 1967. He continued working in the field of public administration until he bought Regency Travel that served corporate travel. This also gave him the opportunity to travel from above the Arctic Circle to Antarctica and all the seven continents with his family. One of his most memorable trips was with his wife, children and grandchildren to Europe, and a South African safari in 2017. He ended his career as the Director of Travel Management in the Office of the President for the University of California from which he retired.

Matthew lived life with zeal and passion. The example he and Anne set by making annual major gifts of support to an organization they loved together, Music in the Vineyards, is an inspiration to us all.

Join us at **Sang~Froid Vineyards** for an intimate performance by **Samara Joy**, featuring the **Pasquale Grasso Trio**, and enjoy delicious wine, appetizers and dessert!

Straight from New York, **Samara Joy** burst onto the jazz scene in 2019 when she won the Sarah Vaughan International Jazz Vocal Competition. Following the 2021 release of her self-titled debut album Downbeat called the 22-year-old artist a "deeply emotive vocalist, with power that usually takes a lot of living to master."

Samara is joined by the **Pasquale Grasso Trio**, born in Italy and now based in New York City, the 30-year- old guitarist has developed an astounding technique and concept informed not by jazz guitarists so much as by bebop pioneers like Bud Powell, Charlie Parker and Dizzy Gillespie and the classical-guitar tradition. His intensive studies of both midcentury jazz and classical meld into a signature mastery that is, remarkably, at once unprecedented and evocative.

In his interview for Vintage Guitar magazine's February 2016 cover story, Pat Metheny was asked to name some younger musicians who'd impressed him. "The best guitar player I've heard in maybe my entire life is floating around now, Pasquale Grasso," said the jazz-guitar icon and NEA Jazz Master. "This guy is doing something so amazingly musical and so difficult."

A Trip to the Moon

Inspired by a wide variety of sources, the film follows a group of astronomers who travel to the Moon in a cannon-propelled capsule, explore the Moon's surface, escape from an underground group of Selenites (lunar inhabitants), and return to Earth with a captive Selenite. In 2000, the American Film Institute, as part of its AFI 100 Years ... series, ranked the film #62 in its list of the funniest films of all time.

Named the guartet-in-residence at Indiana University's Jacobs School of Music in March 2012, the Pacifica was previously the quartet-in-residence at the Metropolitan Museum of Art and was the recipient of a Grammy Award for Best Chamber Music Performance. Formed in 1994, the Pacifica Quartet quickly won chamber music's top competitions, and was awarded an Avery Fisher Career Grant. In 2009, the Quartet was named "Ensemble of the Year" by Musical America. From their first appearance at MITV in 2002, the Pacifica has been an audience favorite, and has

performed in the Napa Valley more than any other ensemble in the history of MITV!

Becky was first introduced to classical music by her parents, who took her to hear the New York Phil's Young People's Concerts led by Leonard Bernstein. Today, she is the host and part of the creative team of the New York Philharmonic's Very Young People's Concerts. Known as "Viola Mom" on TikTok (ry_violamom), Becky's wacky sense of humor is proving, once and for all, that Classical Music does not have to be stuffy and boring! She is a graduate of the Juilliard School.
